

No meeting in December

Here are some further notes giving the background to some of names on the war memorial, first erected in 1921

Arthur Stevens – lived with his parents William and Ellen and his brothers and sisters in a stone cottage in Station Road. Several of the siblings died under the age of 2. William was

Arthur W Thame (or Tame) sustained in battle in Flanders, aged

sustained in battle in Flanders, aged 21. He worked at Upper Prescote with his father. He was buried in the Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery in Belgium. His mother lived in Red Lion Street from 1926.

Matthew Townsend – had been living in Chipping Warden with his wife Florence and baby son, Harry, at the time of the 1911 census. They then moved to Kentish Cottage, Cropredy. His father - also Matthew - lived in Great Bourton, and Matthew was known as Henry or Harry, perhaps to distinguish him from the father. His mother was Elizabeth, née Cherry. He served as a gunner in 303 Siege Battery in the Royal Garrison Artillery, but lost his life on 23 January 1917, aged 35.

There are more details held in a file at St Mary the Virgin Church, Cropredy, thanks to the work of Cropredy Historical Society archivist, Sue Lester. We will feature further names from the monument in future editions. Ed.



Minutes of a meeting of Cropredy Parish Council held in the Methodist Chapel on Monday 8th November 2021 at 7pm

Present: Councillors Tania Johnson (Chairman), Bob Garland, Sheila Jones, Des Knight, Margaret Boscott, Jacqui Smith, District Cllr Phil Chapman County Cllr George Reynolds and David Best (Clerk). No members of the public attended the meeting.

- 1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE: Cllr Karla Martin
- 2. **DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST:** Cllr Bob Garland in respect of any decisions relating to the History Club.
- 3. **MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING** The minutes of the meeting of 11th October were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.
- 4. MATTERS ARISING: None.

5. VILLAGE MAINTENANCE AND IMPROVEMENT

Children's playing field – John Taylor will shorten the wire on the zipwire, but the skateboard surface repairs will be left until the weather improves next year.

Bulbs planting – The bulbs donated by Richard Behgin were planted by a working group of Councillors, Karen Bullen and Mr David Cherry.

Top Green working party – A group of Councillors recently cleared up the Top Green.

Creampot Lane and New Close – a working party will try to clear these if the weather permits in December.

Hell Hole retaining wall – This has deteriorated further due to the heavy rain. Mr Tony Brummell, CDC Building Control Manager, has recommended weep holes are installed and an inspection is carried out by a structural engineer.

Cropredy Village Sign – The new village sign along Mollington Rd has been installed.

Church Wall – This has been inspected by a stone mason who will submit a report with recommendations.

6. TRANSPORT, TRAFFIC & STREET LIGTING

School Car Park – A meeting between all parties involved is being scheduled. Approach has been made to three solicitors for legal support quotes on the 'Letter Licence Agreement'. One solicitor has been recommended by the Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils.

Community Speedwatch Initiative – Thames Valley Police has recommended a handheld camera device which is £150-£200. The Parish Council will be registering on the scheme on 26th November. Volunteers would be necessary for this scheme and three would be required for each speed check. In addition to this there is an initiative entitled '20mph in Oxfordshire and a TOOL KIT' where Oxfordshire is one of the first Counties to consider widespread reductions from 30mph to 20mph over the next three years. Initially there are five trial sites, Cuxham, Wallingford Central, Wallingford North, Kirtlington and Long Wittenham. If speeds do not decrease, they will consider traffic calming.

Car parking on bend outside The Brasenose Arms – Oxfordshire County Council has outsourced parking enforcement. It is possible to apply to OCC for yellow lines. The OCC fee for this work could be £4000 and it could take months to implement.

Streetlights – Streetlight No 1 on the High Street has been repaired.

7. VILLAGE EMERGENCY PLAN, CRIME PREVENTION & ENVIRONMENT

Police Rural Liaison Meeting – Cllrs Sheila Jones and Tania Johnson will attend this meeting.

8. PARISH COUNCIL USE OF INTERNET & SOCIAL MEDIA

New Website – There was a vote of thanks to Cllr Karla Martin for building the new website and a vote of thanks to Mr Hugh Brooman who has provided a USB stick with information from the previous website which is being transferred onto the new site. There has been a reduction in the annual cost for hosting the website.

It is working well and there has been lots of positive feedback about the new website.

There is a need to advise residents about planning applications. This could be done via the website and Facebook page.

A Cropredy Parish Council Facebook page has been created and information is growing. Parish Councillors have admin access to the page. It was agreed that rules will be drawn up for adding information and news.

9. PLANNING, CLIMATE CHANGE, FINANCE & LEGAL

Cherwell Local Plan 2040 response – Cllr Bob Garland had drafted a response from the Parish Council on the Options and comments on the 4 potential development sites.

Work will continue on preparation of the Cropredy Plan/ Vision. The Parish Council's starting point is that any development should be appropriate in size and design and benefical to the village. In the future, if there were any development in the village sufficient to secure 'developer benefits', District Councillor Phil Chapman advised that the Parish Council could learn from the experience of Great Bourton in this respect.

The Parish Council has been notified of an appeal hearing to the enforcement notice to use of land for a residential caravan without permission at The Stables, Main Road, Great Bourton (CDC Ref: 20/00419/ENF). This is a very technical appeal over whether a caravan has been occupied for 10 years. The Parish Council has no input into this.

10. SPORTS AND SOCIAL CLUB:

Cable connection to carpark lighting and floodlights – This had found to be faulty and a temporary cable has been installed by a qualified electrician until a more permanent repair can be carried out.

Hedge cutting – one more cut will be carried out this year.

11. FINANCE

Balance Sheet – Reserves are currently £105,892. Expenditure for the year is below income but the only outstanding income is the VAT reclaim. Significant grounds maintenance bills are still due.

Barclays Bank Mandate – A mandate change request form has been submitted add new Councillors and delete people who are no longer councillors.

Unity Trust Bank Mandate - A mandate change request has been made to add Cllr Des Knight as a signatory.

12. COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT -

20 mph Speed initiative – OCC has budgeted £8.5 million for this. Enforcement may remain an issue if speed limits are lowered in villages.

Civil Parking Enforcement - OCC has contracted this out. It was previously the responsibility of Thames Valley Police.

Councillor pay increase - Councillors have voted to increase their allowances by £1,000 to £12,000.

Cycle Track Scheme – OCC has approved £12.5 m on a new cycle track scheme.

Zero Emission Zone – OCC is proposing to introduce a zero-emission zone in the centre of Oxford so that only zero emission cars could drive into the centre without charge but there are technical issues with trying to implement this.

13. DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - None

14. **CORRESPONDENCE** – None

15. SUB COMMITTEE FOR QUEENS' PLATINUM JUBILEE

It was agreed that the Cllrs Tania Johnson, Karla Martin, Des Knight, Sheila Jones and Margaret Boscott would form the sub-committee.

Mugs for children under 12 years – It was agreed to purchase mugs for children. Cllr Bob Garland will try to obtain the numbers form census data.

16. DONATION TO HISTORY CLUB

It was agreed unanimously that a donation of £250 would be given to the History Club as a contribution towards the cost of shelving to store records.

17. ANY OTHER BUSINESS NOT OF A CONFIDENTIAL NATURE

Trees on the High Street – Some trees are growing into power and telephone lines. It was agreed that the clerk would report these to Western Power and BT Openreach.

Cars parked on Chapel Green – Some vehicles are being parked regularly on the Chapel Green. Notes are being put on them asking owners not to park there regularly.

Signage on The Plantation – Residents have complained about the amount of temporary signage on The Plantation. It was agreed that a policy will be developed for controlling the temporary signage and that The Brasenose will be advised that their recent sign is considered too large and should be removed.

Canal and River Trust - The Canal & River Trust has offered to carry out monthly maintenance with volunteers from the Trust and Cropredy residents on the 3rd Wednesday every month. This will be organised and managed by the Canal & River Trust. The initial work that is proposed is to replace a handrail that can then be painted by Cropredy volunteers.

Footbridge – It was agreed that the clerk will chase OCC to carry out the scheduled repairs to the footbridge and at the same time to decrease the gradient down towards the shop which is very steep and difficult to negotiate with a mobility scooter.
